Have your say on Christchurch Hill pavement widening

Camden will soon need to review the pavement widening on Christchurch Hill.

As your councillors, Cllr Stephen Stark and Cllr Oliver Cooper want to hear what you want to happen so we can stand up for you.

The pavement widening at the junction with Cannon Place was introduced as a temporary measure for six months in June 2021.

Camden Council will now need to review the pavement extension and consult the school and residents on whether to retain it or remove it.

If it were to remain, Camden Council would look to repave the pavement extension either with paving slabs to match the existing adjacent path or buff-coloured surface dressing.

If it were removed, Camden would restore five parking spaces.

Cllr Stephen Stark and Cllr Oliver Cooper want to know what you think. We will then push Camden to do what you want.

CAMDEN DELAYS PLANS TO EARMARK QUEEN MARY'S HOUSE FOR FLATS

Camden was due to adopt a plan to earmark Queen Mary's House for development into flats this month, but delayed it under pressure from Hampstead's local councillors.

This "Site Allocation Local Plan" would amend Camden's planning policy to give permission in principle to develop Queen Mary's - at the junction of East Heath Road and Heath Street - into 150 flats.

A previous version was consulted on pre-pandemic. We objected strongly to this number of flats and arguing for the reprovision of key work accommodation for NHS staff. Camden has privately revised it, but refused to publish its revised version

Camden Conservatives have been campaigning for it to be published and consulted on, as parts have been substantially revised behind closed doors (see below re the O2 Centre). Under pressure, it was withdrawn days before it was due to be adopted.

PLANS FOR 02 CENTRE ALSO DELAYED

The same document as above would also have earmarked the O2 Centre for development into 2,000 flats in a series of 16-storey blocks. This has been delayed too, pending a new 'targeted engagement'.

Camden had only previously consulted on a plan for 950 flats - but it has privately upped it to "1,900 to 2,000" without asing you. As Camden weren't asking your views, we launched a survey, which you can respond to at **www.camden.team/o2** or via the QR code to the right.



LABOUR AND LIB DEMS BLOCK WASTE REVIEW

Hampstead's councillors tabled a motion in November's council meeting to publicly review Camden's waste contract and make sure Camden is using all the tools at its disposal to end the crisis.

Camden has the most fly-tipping of any council in England, has plummeting recycling rates, and has almost no enforcement.

The motion was blocked by other parties' councillors, who blocked it being heard. We will keep pressing for measures, including restoring weekly bin collections, to end Camden's rubbish crisis.
